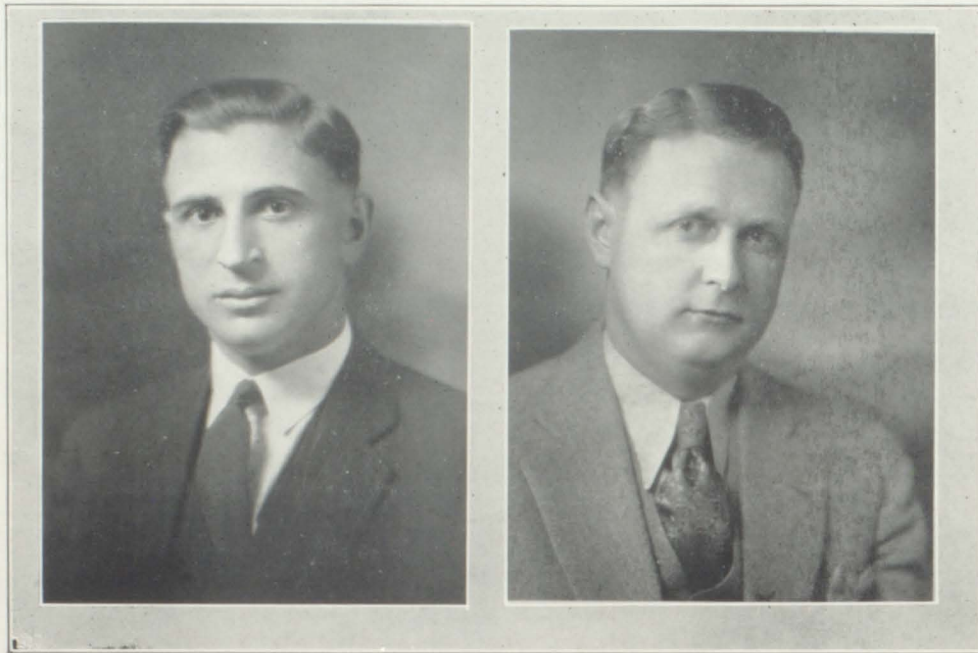
Artist's Drawing of New Central Grade School and Gymnasium

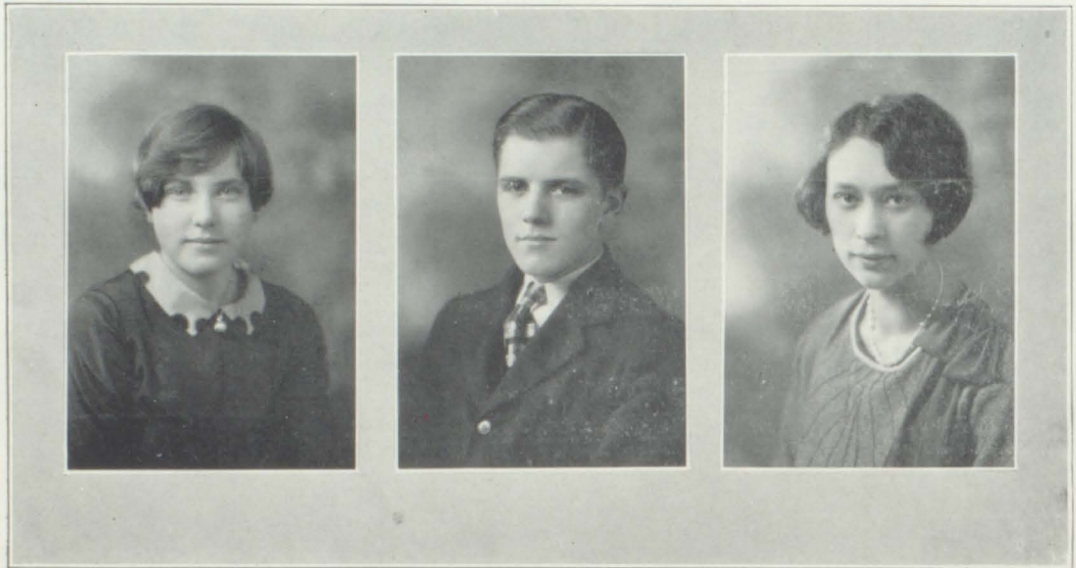

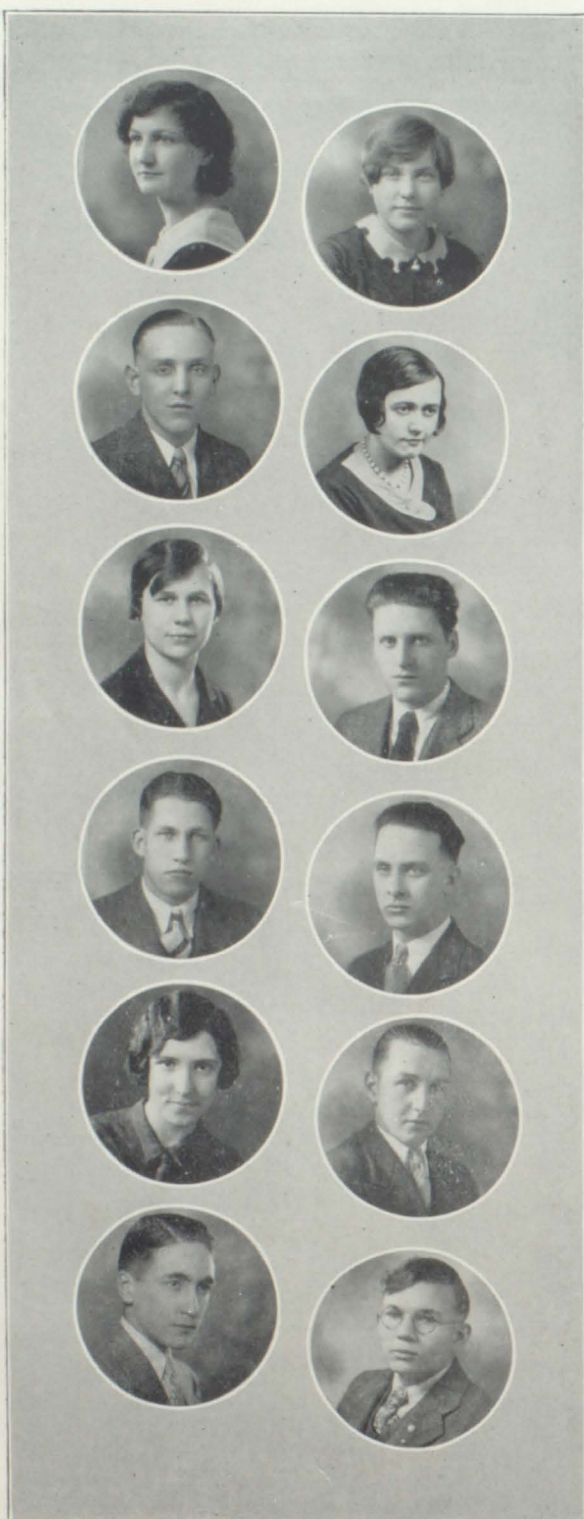

Class History--1929

On September 12, 1925, we, one hundred and thirty adventurous pioneers, started to blaze a path of knowledge for ourselves in the dense scholastic wood of Petoskey High School.

On December 12, we laid down our axes long enough to have a class party, and a little later, on December 17, we allowed the Sophomores to wrest a 2-1 decision from us in debate. Our class displayed marked interest in athletics, debate, and other school activities. About June the 12, we laid our axes down, and proceeded to take a much-needed rest.

In September, 1926, we all returned to renew our labors, and as the way was somewhat easier, we decided to go farther on our journey in a big spring wagon. At our annual class election, we decided to entrust the reins to Isabel Steen, with Catherine Behan, Glenn Snyder, and Charles Moore as assistants.

We stopped on our journey long enough to have a class party, and it was also necessary to halt for a short time for a skirmish with the Freshman Indians in debate. We were the victors with two scalps to their one.

Many of our members distinguished themselves in large and important activities of the school.

Along in June we halted on our journey with the promise all to return and again pursue our travels.

In September, 1927, as wagons were out of date, we decided to proceed farther in a train. We chose Frederick Curtis as engineer, with

Esther Jarman and Lucille Germond as firemen.

This was an exceptionally good year for us as our class produced three champion teams. The Junior debate team won the interclass championship in debate. The Junior Girls' basketball team won the interclass championship, and the boys also were interclass champions. We considered ourselves the "Champion Class."

In February the Junior play, "The Brat" was given. It was a great success. This was directed by Mrs. Stech, and you know any play Mrs. Stech directs is a success. This was a means of replenishing our treasury, so in June when we had more time to devote to the social life, we invited the Seniors over to a real feed, and the affair was voted a great success by everyone, and was a true example, the custom of our class, "second to none."

In the fall of 1928 we all returned to take up our journey again, and we decided that it would be an excellent plan to finish our journey on a boat, so we chartered the good ship "Senior" and chose Elbridge Starmer captain, Esther Jarman first mate, with Barbara Saller as super-cargo.

During the season many of our members have taken active part in the many activities.

As is always the case, we have been very busy this year working on our year-book, which will be a reminder to us of our happy days in good old P. H. S. as members of the "Second to None" Class of the "Second to None" School.

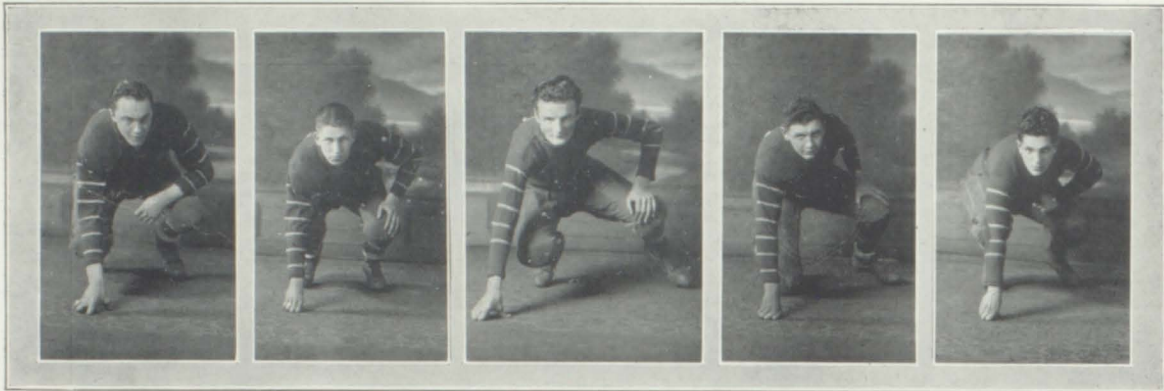
Coach LeCronier

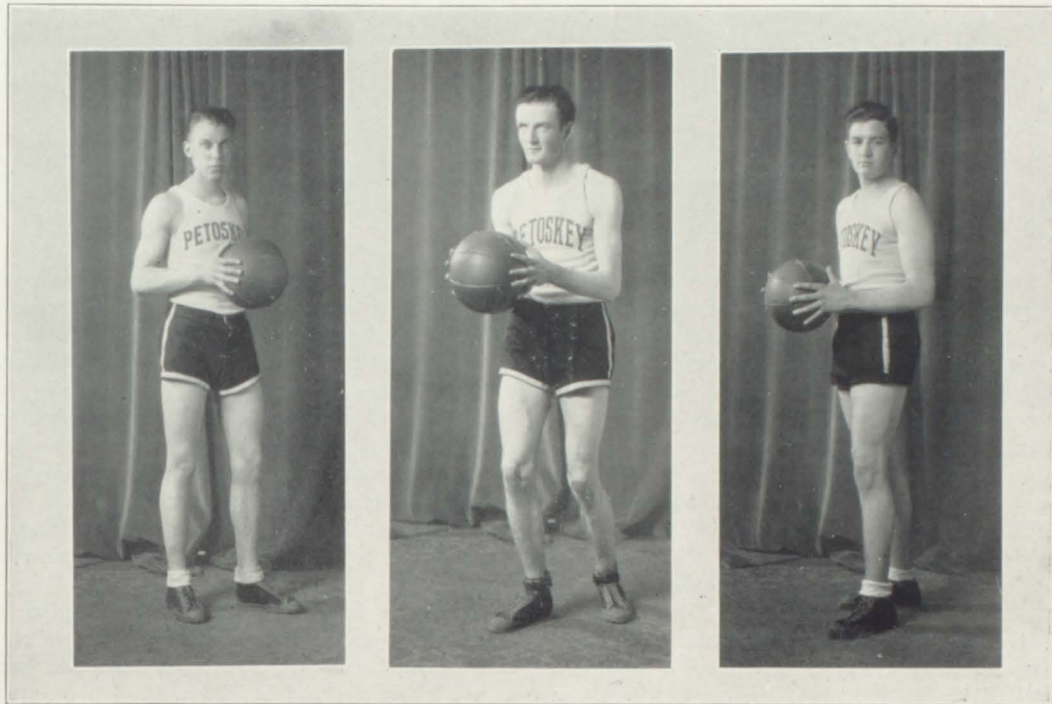

Basketball Tournament

Petoskey's Tenth Annual Regional Basketball Tournament opened Thursday afternoon, March 14, with some fast Class D basketball games. Suttons Bay took St. Anne into camp with a hard-fought game. In the second game of the afternoon the flashy Elk Rapids team outpointed Boyne Falls. Thursday evening Honor defeated Bear Lake and Alba had a hard battle to defeat Copemish. Boyne City defeated Frankfort in the opening game of Class C in a very slow game.

Friday afternoon Elk Rapids showed some real basketball in outpointing the clever Suttons Bay team by a close margin. Later Alba won an easy game from Honor and Boyne City beat Rogers City. Friday night Harbor Springs, the classiest team in the North, found no trouble in drubbing Gaylord. Following the Harbor-Gaylord game came the Manistee-Alpena battle in which Manistee lived up to expectations and defeated Alpena. By this time the gym was packed for the Traverse City-Petoskey game. Petoskey was slow in starting and Traverse soon took the lead. The visitors soon had enough points to win and the game was on ice for Traverse.

Saturday afternoon one of the finest games seen in the court in years was played when Alba met Elk Rapids. It was a battle to the final whistle with Elk Rapids one point ahead and the winner of Class D.

Class C was decided Saturday night when Boyne City and Harbor Springs met—the battle of a century. The teams were very evenly matched and the championship was very decided until the last fifteen seconds of play when Harbor made a beautiful shot from the side of the court.

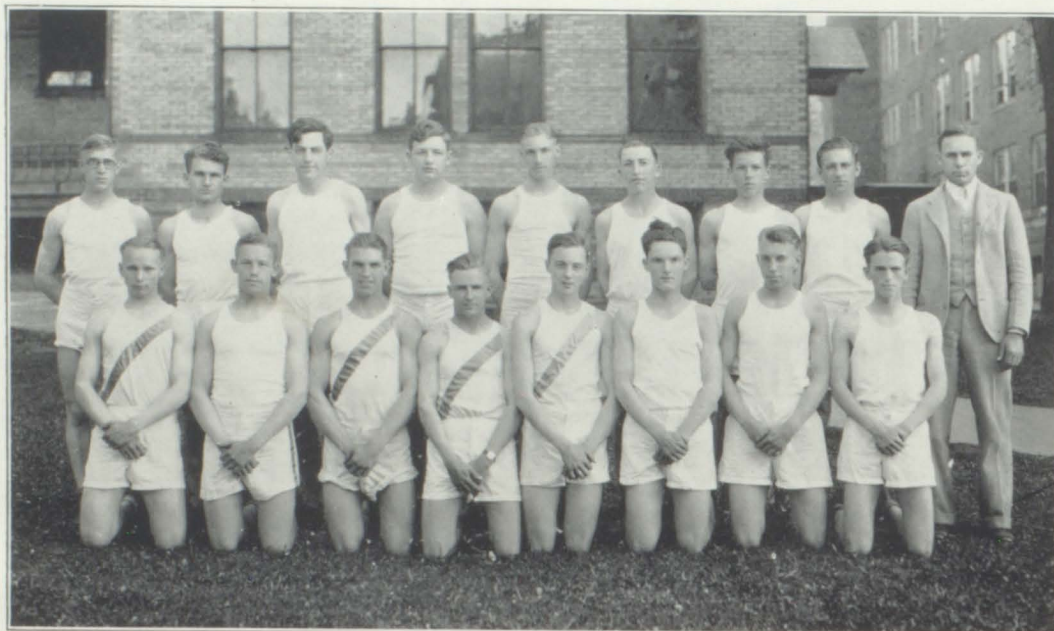
In the final battle Traverse City defeated Manistee in a close game by one point, thus winning Class B. The tournament, in general, was characterized by clean, hard playing, large crowds, and good officiating.

At the State Tournament Elk Rapids, showing her usual flashy playing, won second place in Class D. Harbor Springs surprised all fans by bringing home the State Class C Championship after some hard fought, close games. Traverse City could not get started in the opening game of the first round and was eliminated in a hard battle with Stambaugh.

Track



Northern Michigan Meet

For the twelfth consecutive time Petoskey High School won the Northern Michigan track laurels. Petoskey led with a total of $61\frac{1}{2}$ points. Cadillac was a close second with $51\frac{1}{2}$, while Ludington and Traverse City had 39 and 2 respectively.

Ray March was easily high point man with four firsts and one second. This tall battler set a new record for the high jump with a leap of 5 feet $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches. He captured first in the broad jump, threw the javelin to victory with a toss of 140 feet 5 inches, and led the field in the two-twenty. His second came in the hundred where Holland, the speedy runner from Cadillac, led the field.

Curtis was the other record-breaker, taking the pole vault honors by a jump of 10 feet 6 inches. He was second in the high jump, third in javelin, and fourth in the broad jump. Cadillac had the best field men they have had in three years—Harvey, Wagner, and Troy placing one, three and four in the shot put. Locke placed second in this event. Ludington did not appear to be very strong in the morning session but surprised the fans on the cinder path when they scored in every track event.

State Meet

In the State meet three individual championships, one individual tie for second honors, third place in team totals, and the meet's high point man were honors Petoskey received at East Lansing.

March won the high jump at 5 ft. 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., the broad jump with a leap of 21 ft. 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., and the javelin with a heave of 149 ft. 7 in. March had a total of 15 points for high point man of the meet.

Curtis tied for second place in the pole vault, leaping the bar at 10 ft. 10 in. The winning jump was 11 ft. 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. Curtis' tie gave Petoskey two more points for a team total of 17 for a tie at third place.



Golf

A new event was introduced in Petoskey High School's list of spring athletic activities. This sport was golf and met with a great success the first year. A tournament was held, open to all students in the high school, to pick a suitable golf team to represent Petoskey in golf meets with other schools. Students who placed among the first were: Glen Dashner, Stanley Kellogg, Bill Casper, and Bob Coveyou. They formed a team and competed with Harbor Springs twice, losing both meets. Later they showed up better at Traverse City, placing fifth in the regional tournament.

Minor sport letters were given this year as a reward to each member of the team and it is hoped that in future years we may develop this ever-growing sport so that Petoskey will rank among the first in golf.

Tennis

On May 16, 1928, Fred Curtis was crowned tennis champion of Petoskey High School for the second time in two years. After a series of matches between classes the leaders of each division were chosen to play off for the championship. Curtis, in his march toward the top, defeated Stone of the Sophomores 6-1, 6-0. The following day he triumphed over Upton and Bristol in quick fashion. In the championship match he easily defeated Ellis 6-3, 6-4.

Owing to the conflict that arose in the date set for the track championship meet at Cadillac and the regional tennis tournament, "Fritz" was unable to compete in the tennis tournament and Petoskey entered no one in that event for 1928.

Forensics

Petoskey High School can feel proud of the record made by her debate teams and orators. Our four debaters were Martin Beer, Robert Mitchell, Martin Guleserian and Charles Moore. The latter having had two years of past experience.

The season opened with a snappy and exciting encounter with our northern foe, Cheboygan, and after much deliberation the judges finally awarded a 2 to 1 decision to our opponents. However much praise was given to the work of Petoskey High's representatives, and Cheboygan, after capturing the State championship, declared that the battle with our team was the hardest one they fought.

Next we tackled Traverse City. Their debaters, after well received speeches, were

awarded a unanimous decision.

However, our dauntless spirit still prevailed and we went next to Harbor Springs, resolved to win. Nevertheless, "Lady Luck" deserted our brave speakers by a decision of 1 to 0.

For the fourth debate we drew a bye which is counted as a unanimous decision.

The debate question was: Resolved, that a Federal Subsidy for the Development of an American Merchant Marine Would Be a Wise National Policy.

We were represented in our oratorical contests by Martin Beer, who chose as his subject, "The Negro Problem." After winning the local contest he took third place in the sub-district contest at Charlevoix. There were six schools competing in this contest.



Social Activities

The social activities of Petoskey High School this school year, although not numerous, have been highly successful.

The Student Council has thus far sponsored four parties. The last two were of special interest.

The one given in co-operation with the Pep Club and entertaining the schools with which we played football games, climaxed the grid season. Many schools were represented and helped to make this party a very successful one.
