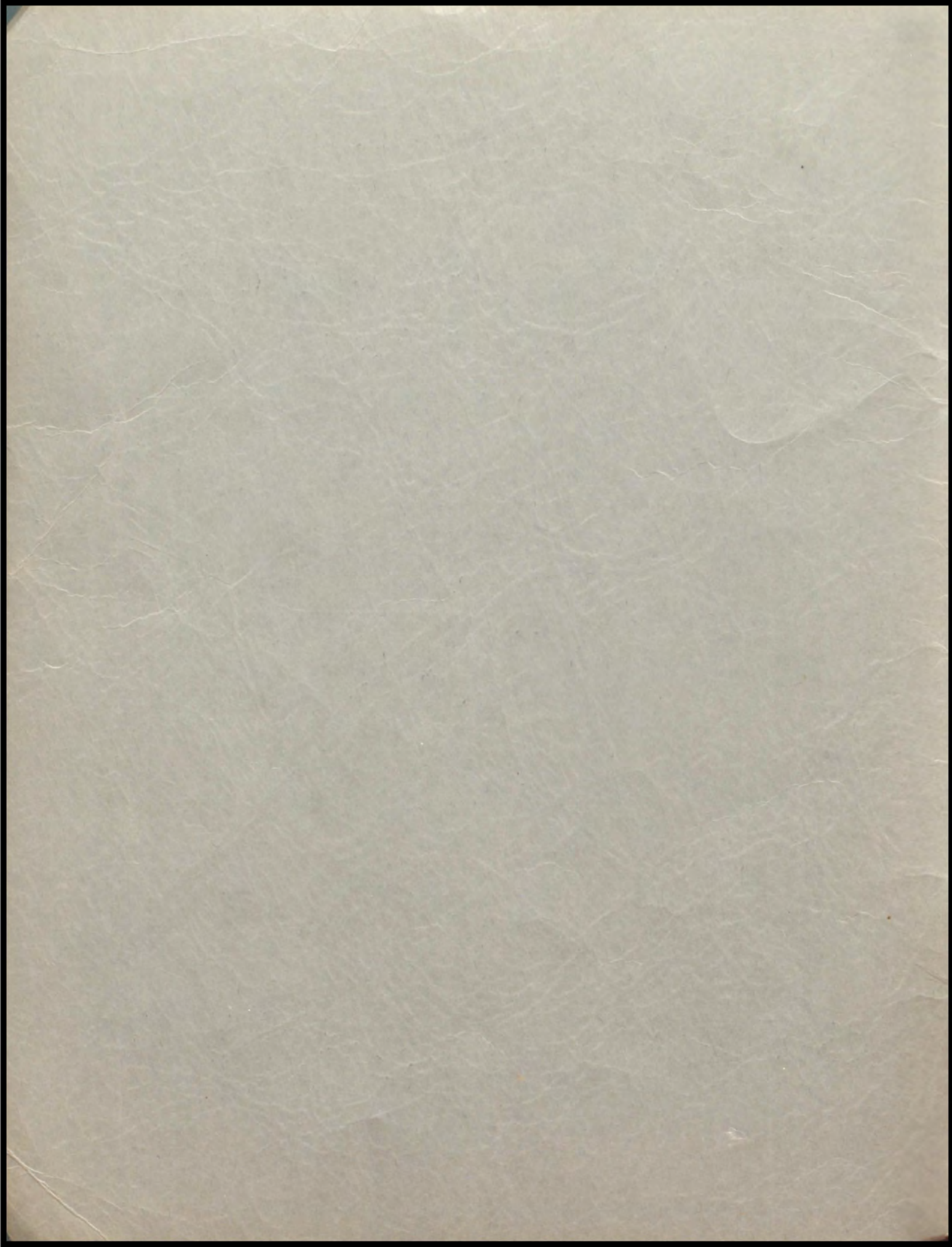

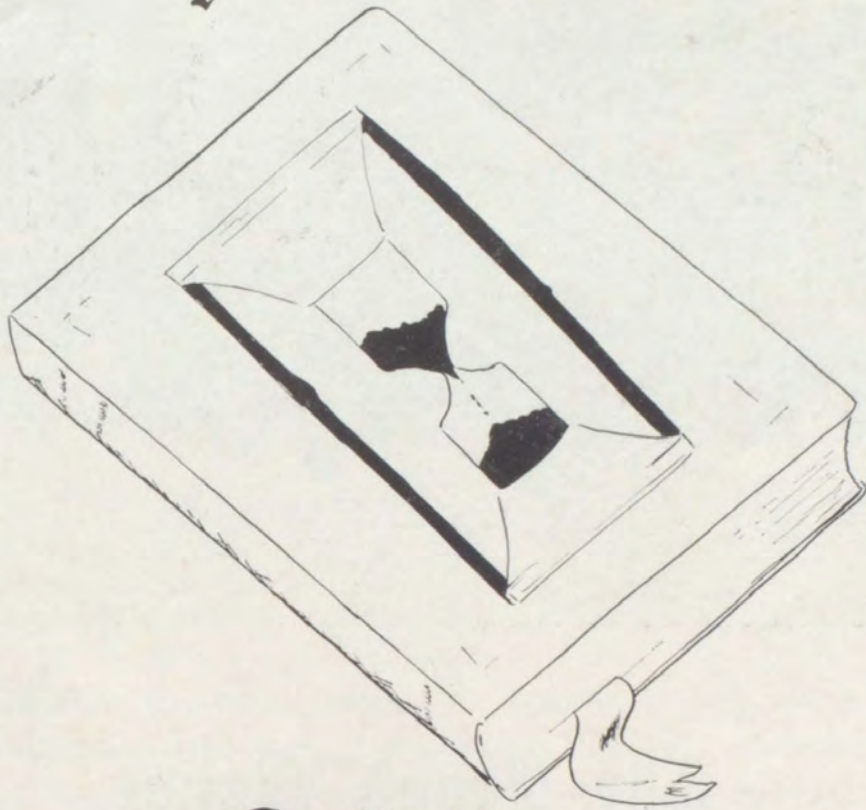

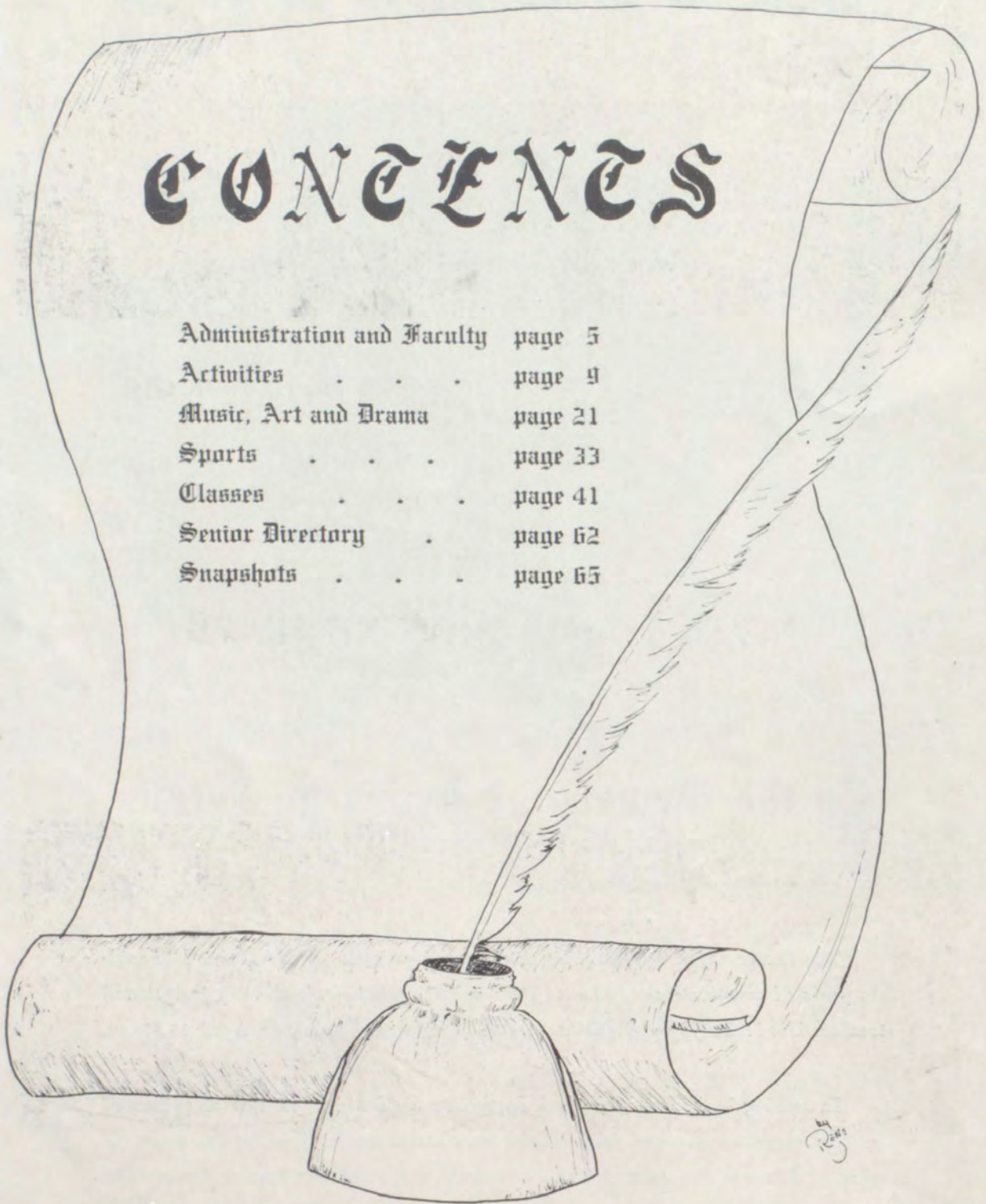
To the Memory of Frank S. Jacobs

Honor Society

To emphasize the four cardinal objectives, scholarship, leadership, character, and service, and to hold them before the student body as objectives for which they should strive, is the purpose of the National Honor Society. The Petosega Chapter of the Honor Society was organized in 1925, and in the past 23 years nearly 300 students have been elected to our chapter. Members are chosen from the upper quarter of their class and are elected by joint vote of the faculty and chapter members on the basis of their scholarship, leadership, character, and service records during their high school years.

The business staff is headed by the business managers who take care of the books and accounts, and the Advertising Manager. Under the Ad Manager is the advertising staff, which helps finance the paper by soliciting and collecting ads from city merchants. Through the co-operation of these two volunteer staffs, your Hi-Light reached you every other Thursday.

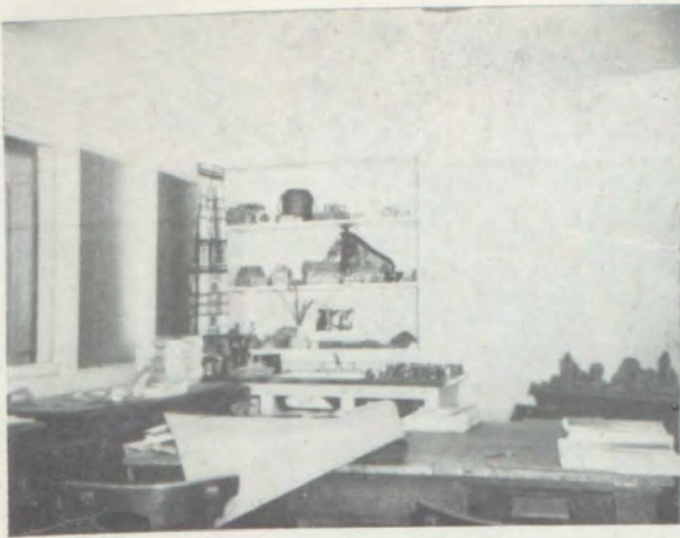
Dance Orchestra

the mural which was designed by Mr. Hildebrandt and worked out by the Class of '48, the refreshment table, the king and queen and the dance floor.

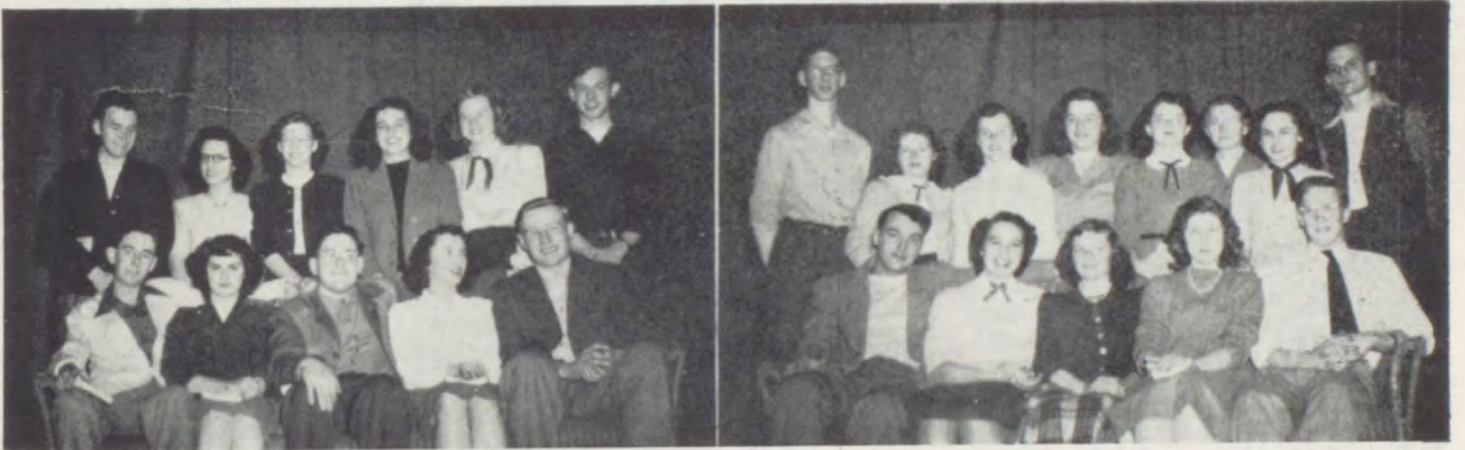

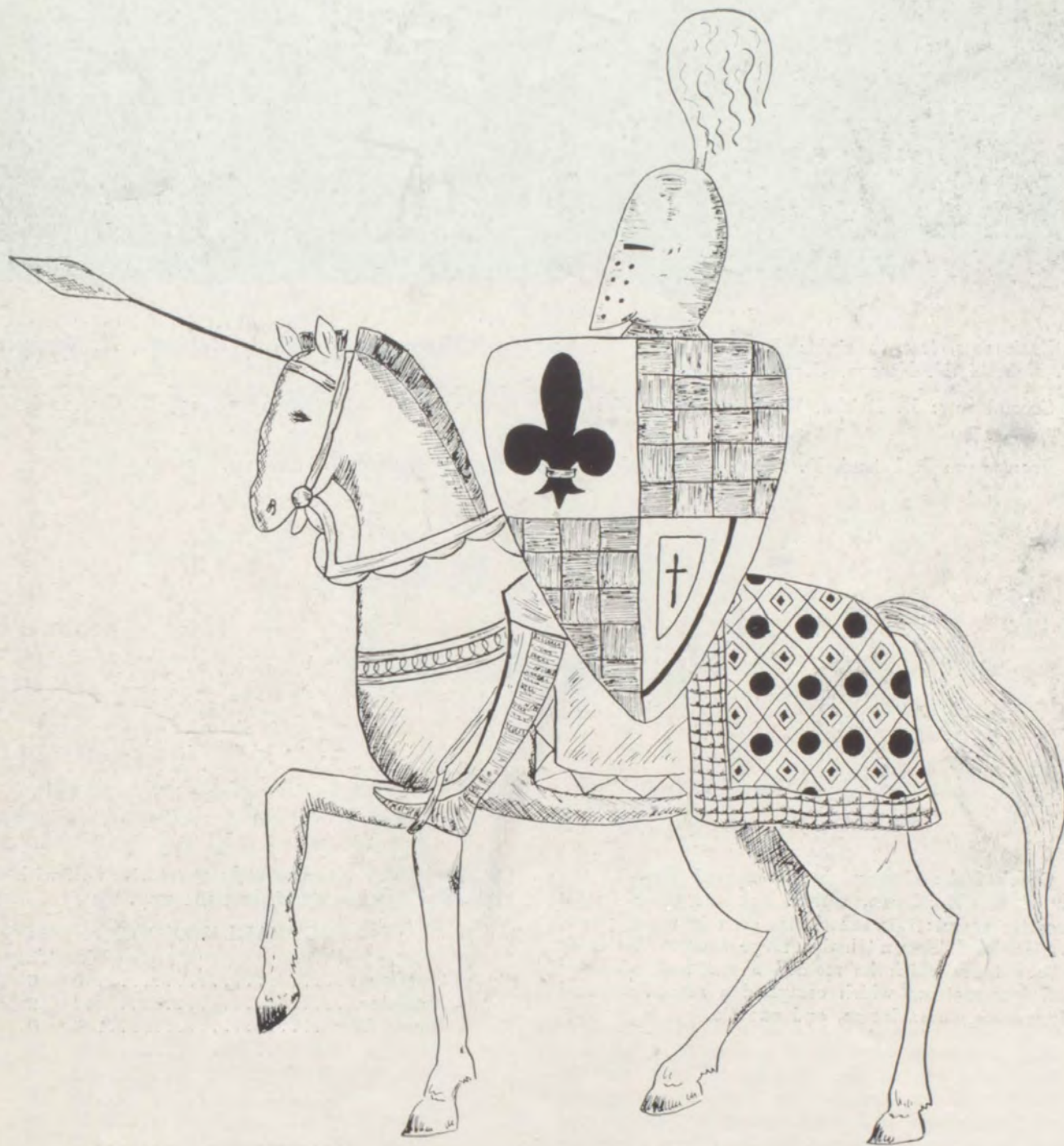

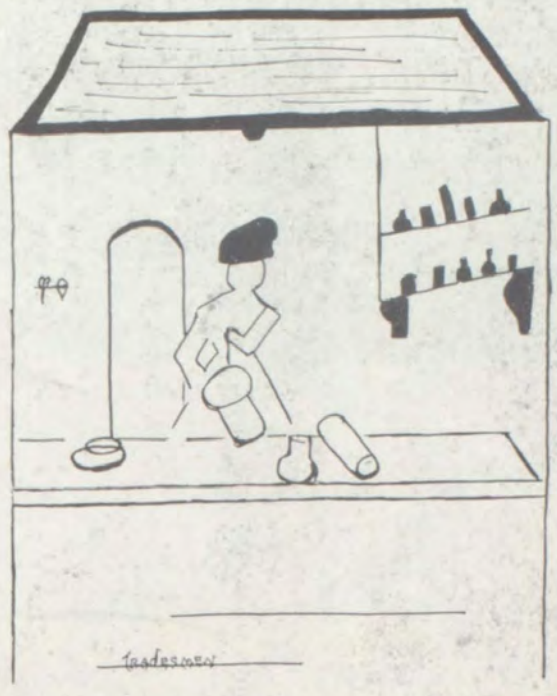

When we returned to the Grand Manor as Tradesmen we found our number had depreciated to 102 — this could have been due to the hardships endured as serfs. We tried to fatten the royal pocketbook by sponsoring various concessions and dances, but at the end of the year, due to the lack of gold we forfeited our annual class picnic so as to have enough captial to provide a more prosperous year as Vassals.

During this year as managers were Jim Howe, president, Joyce Knight, vice-president, and Bob Dau, secretary-treasurer.

Upon becoming Vassals, we found our number increased to 120, largely due to the new recruits from St. Francis High School. Our first step into the "World of Thespians" was taken when we presented "But Fair Tomorrow", a highly successful comedy. In the spring, seven of our cell-mates were elected to the National Honor Society.

The annual Junior-Senior Banquet was held in the Rebekah lodge hall on May 3. An interesting program on radio, and delicious victuals were enjoyed by all.

To high-light our year as vassals we gave the ever popular Ball which carried the theme of the Mardi Gras. Due to Overseers Garthe and Aho and many willing workers it proved to be one of the most beautiful and successful J-Hops ever to be remembered.

September, 1947, gave us the royal title of Lords and Ladies, 124 of us to be exact. At last we were the ruling body and the underclassmen had to bow to us. We chose as our overlords, Jim Scoggin, president, Jim Howe, vice-president, and Bill Davy, secretary treasurer.

Shortly after the entrance of 1948, twelve more seniors were admitted to the National Honor Society, filling the quota of 15% of the class.

Before moving out of the Grand Manor into the larger courts of the world, we took our last step in front of the floodlights; in April we presented "The Divine Flora", a comedy with a large cast.

The class of '49 showed their appreciation to the lords and ladies by presenting a farewell feast and festival in the form of the annual Junior-Senior Banquet and J-Hop.

To end the year of all years we enjoyed a class picnic, and all the activities of Commencement week. As we receive our diplomas and walk through the portals of the Grand Manor, perhaps a little sadly, perhaps a little gladly, we say goodbye to all we leave behind.

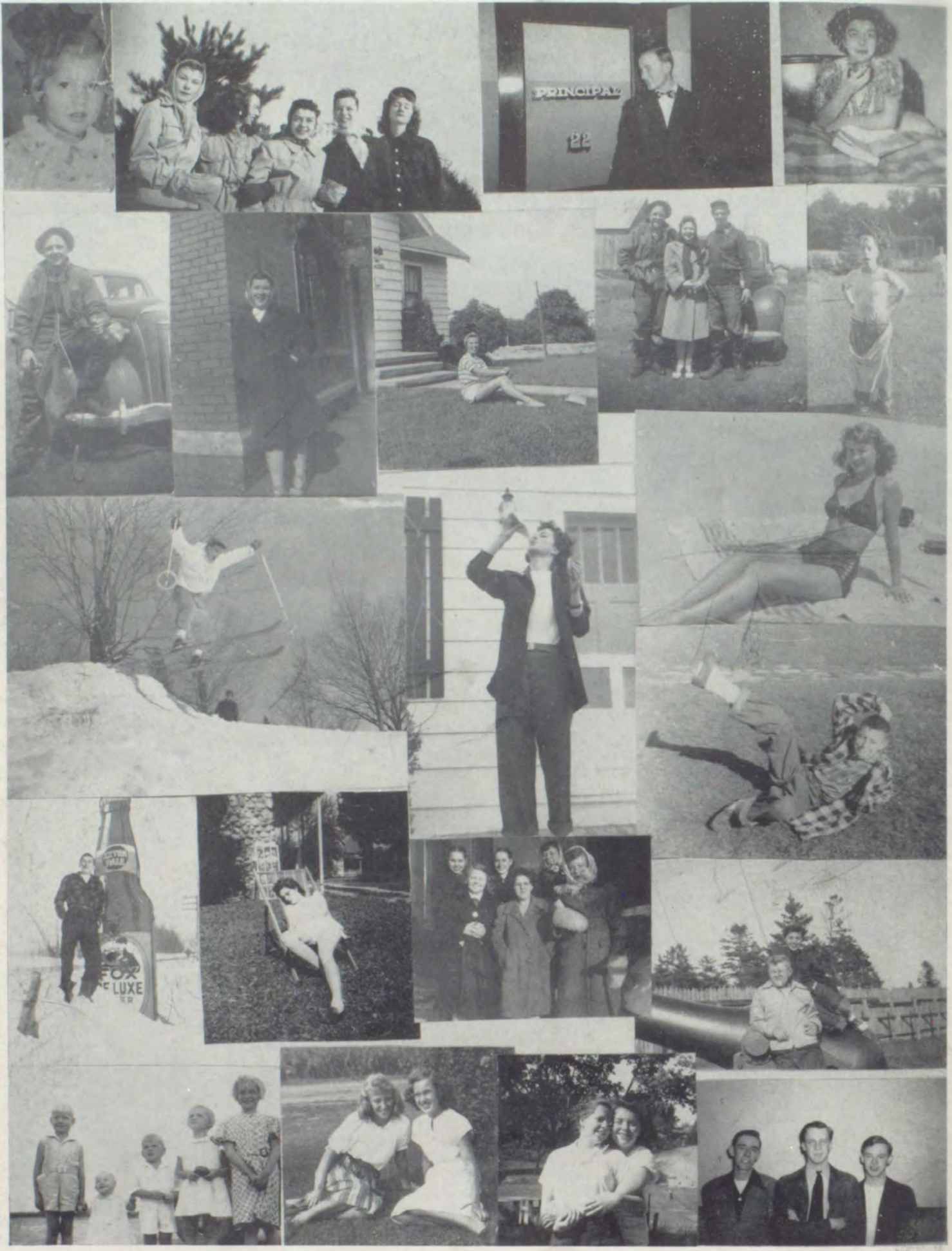
