

Help Give 'Loads of Love'

For years the Petoskey District Library (PDL) carried on a tradition of collecting canned goods and paper products from patrons who wished to waive their overdue library fines. The program was always so popular that patrons still ask about it.

In 2017, the library board changed PDL policy to eliminate the daily overdue fines, giving patrons flexibility and an extended grace period in returning PDL materials. While there are no longer overdue fines, the library has continued to keep the giving tradition alive.

Last year, the library housed a winter coat drive in the vestibule of its east door entrance on Mitchell Street, next to the 24/7 lockers. The initiative was wildly successful, with donated items flooding in and frequently overwhelming the entryway.

"These donations reflect our community's ongoing care and commitment to one another," said Jodi Haven, PDL's public services librarian. "We get a lot of people through our doors each day, and we know this time of year many want to find a way to give back."

This December, patrons can donate new hygiene and laundry products to "Loads of Love", a program which supports the Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan (WRCNM) Safe Home.

The Safe Home is operated 24/7 and provides a secure, caring and supportive place for survivors of domestic abuse and sexual assault and their family members. Families staying at the Safe Home are also provided with meals and all their daily needs at no cost.

PDL is honored to have the opportunity to raise awareness about the Safe Home and partner with the WRCNM on its "Loads of Love" program.

The Life of Aldo Leopold **FEBRUARY 10**





A big thank you to the residents of Bear Creek Township and Resort Township on their November 5 vote to renew the Library millage. They joined Little Traverse and Springvale townships, who approved a similar renewal in August. The 0.4 of a mill the Library receives from these townships will support the operations of the Library from 2025–2028 and will allow the residents to continue utilizing all Library services. The benefits of the Library extend far beyond traditional services of lending materials. The Library will continue to offer specialty services like meeting rooms, notary services, printing/copying, Wi-Fi, and the Library of Things. It's about investing in the collective well-being and prosperity of the whole community, ensuring everyone has access to resources and opportunities needed to thrive.

How do we know what those resources and opportunities are? Well, we talk to our residents. We are in the midst of strategic planning to help guide us through 2028. The "Learn Phase", at the beginning of the planning process, is designed to gather input and information about the community and the Library. The planning team has survey data, community data, demographic data, and Library benchmark data to review and analyze. We also hosted five different focus groups for us to hone in on specific questions and to find potential ways the Library may be able to fill a niche service. This information is reviewed by the Library Board and Library staff who will then work on the second phase of the plan, the "Dream Phase."

The "Dream Phase" is when the Library board will participate in a retreat to discuss the information gathered in the "Learn Phase" and come up with "Strategic Priorities" for the Library. They will also review the Library's mission and vision to see if they may need to be updated. After the Board has finalized their priorities, the Library staff then have a retreat where they will review the documentation and come up with an action plan.

The phase of the planning is the "Do Phase", where the planning information gathered from the Board and staff






